Law Firms

It's Petco Park on a summer evening. The sun is going down, and the field lights buzz. Robert Frances, managing partner of Latham & Watkins, is sitting in the stands with his family.

Like so many others in San Diego, Frances loves Petco Park. He loves how it brings the community together. He loves how it brings him to downtown. He loves the investment in San Diego's economic future that it represents.

He, like many others, feels a sense of hometown pride. But Frances also feels another kind of pride, one of a job well done. As a lawyer, he had the opportunity to work with the Padres and JMI Realty to bring Petco Park to life.

"I am fortunate to work on projects that bring so much to the San Diego community," Frances said. "It is a great feeling to sit in the stadium and see the community come together."

Petco Park is just one of Latham & Warkins' high-profile clients. The firm provided counsel during the development of the Omni San Diego Hotel and the Kimpton Solamar Hotel downtown, as well as during the refinancing of The Lodge at Torrey Pines

Now, Frances is representing FS Investors in its attempt to bring a Major League Soccer team to the city, a \$4 billion project that would redevelop the Qualcomm Stadium site with a hotel, an entertainment center,


As Frances' experience suggests, every major real estate development, every business deal and every city project need lawyers to make deals and help move things along as quickly as possible. Lawyers navigate land use issues, construction financing, power plant development, environmental issues and other equally complex transactions.

Latham & Watkins, a national power-house, is one of 20 law firms that have the biggest effect on the local economy. To identify the area's most important law firms, Our City reviewed data and spoke with experts to assess each firm's influence, as well as to learn whether other firms recommend them.

The result is a mix of firms, both large and small, that handle real estate, business, labor and other issues that affect business and real estate in San Diego County.

While many of the firms are well known, the market has changed during the years and continues to do so.

Mickey Maher, managing partner at Hecht Solberg Robinson Goldberg & Bagley, has had a front-row seat to the evolving legal needs of San Diego's business and

Gordon Gray helped found the Zoological Society of San Diego, and Jay Rains helped bring the U.S. Open to Torrey Pines. DLA Piper currently serves an array of San Diego companies, from startups to multinational companies.

Fish attorneys defended clients in 172 patent cases in 2017. That's about 100 cases more than its nearest competitor, earning it a reputation as the top patent litigation firm in the U.S. Of course, these are national statistics, but its San Diego office enjoys a similar reputation on the local level, helping clients succeed in high-stakes, bet-the-company lawsuits.



real estate. Maher began representing developers for the Rancho Bernardo community nearly 30 years ago.

"There's just not many of those types of neighborhoods," Maher said. "Folks who still develop single-family homes trended toward publicly traded companies. The in-fill developers tend to be more entrepreneurial. Land use, without question, is the biggest challenge to San Diego today."

Robert Caplan, shareholder and president of Seltzer Caplan McMahon Vitek, could drive almost anywhere in San Diego County and point out a project his firm has worked on. When he got his start in the 1960s, Caplan worked primarily with developers of single-family homes. There was new land to develop, and the population was growing.

As demand for housing grew, developers became more entrepreneurial, Caplan said. High-rise apartment buildings and mixed-use developments grew in popularity. Through the decades, he's seen firsthand how San Diego's housing needs shifted, and the market pivoted, and so did legal services.

"The risk element in building a high-rise is infinitely greater than a single-family-home community," Caplan explained. "You can't sell just a few units and wait to finance the rest of the project."

Although it continues to take on new business, Caplan said the 70-year-old firm has enjoyed many long-term relationships with clients committed to building the city's future

"We like being of service to everybody who does business or wants to do business here in the San Diego community," Caplan said. "We are just a local law firm with one



location, so our success depends on representing clients involved in San Diego."


And this includes pro bono clients. Caplan has assisted cultural institutions such as the San Diego Symphony and the Museum of Contemporary Art. Seltzer Caplan tries to create a culture of giving back to the community, Caplan said.

Local law firms have also supported San Diego businesses through the tech boom of the 2000s and the rapid growth of the life sciences industry since then. Many firms are currently poised to help with the emerging cannabis industry.

However, legal services are not exactly a booming industry in San Diego, said Larry Watanabe, a legal recruiter at Watanabe Nason & Schwartz. In terms of growth, San Diego falls far behind markets such as Houston, Dallas, San Francisco and Boston. Watanabe, who was instrumental in bringing national law firms to San Diego in the 2000s, has watched as some of the largest have left the region.

"There just isn't the industry here to support Big Law partner fees," Watanabe said.

Aside from Qualcomm and a few other companies, most local and regional businesses are priced out of the \$1,200-per-hour partner billing rate charged by large international law firms.



Watanabe has worked with lawyers who, over time, left those Big Law firms to join firms that worked with local and regional clients. Firms such as Latham & Watkins; Procopio; Dentons; and Pillsbury are still national, but they have more flexible fee structures, Watanabe explained, making legal representation more affordable for San

Diego clients.

Eric Kremer, managing partner at Pillsbury, said his position allows him to serve regional client and tackle some of San Diego's most pressing issues. Describing San Diego's geographical limitations – surrounded by an international border, a military base, the desert and the Pacific Ocean – Kremer said



a lack of developable land isn't the only issue. There are also transportation issues, the shortage of commercial property for light industrial use and a plethora of environmental concerns.

"We are trying to solve some of these problems that we have here in San Diego, which are not unique," Kremer said. "We have to take a more thoughtful approach to zoning and land use and forecast what will be the best mix for San Diego's future needs."

Some lawyers are shedding their Big Law roles for more nimble operations. At just five years old, CGS3 attracts experienced, partner-level lawyers with deep market expertise. And already the firm's fingerprints are all over San Diego's high-profile developments, such as Liberty Station, Westfield UTC and the Sempra Energy headquarters.

Sean Southard, an attorney with CGS3, credits the firm's success to its ability to quickly complete deals and maintain amicable business relationships. The ability to lock in deals quickly is imperative to success in San Diego's red hot real estate market.

"We are able to compete with the big firms because we have a deep bench with a high level of expertise and we can scale quickly," Southard said. "Our firm is much more nimble in the way we can arrange fees, and we leverage market knowledge to close deals much faster than our competition.

"It is the difference between a battleship and a Coast Guard cutter."

But as much as lawyers want their clients to move quickly and succeed in business, legal disputes do arise. When a business deal goes south, the finger-pointing begins, and someone will be held responsible. That is where the lawyers at Noonan Lance Boyer & Banach step in.

Focused solely on litigation, it works with businesses, such as real estate developers, to handle business and commercial lawsuits. Ethan Boyer, a partner at the firm, started litigating 24 years ago after graduating from University of California, Berkeley, School of Law.

"Every case is its own little puzzle that you have to learn about the client, the problem, a

new industry. And so you become, for a brief time, a specialist in whatever type of business or issue you are dealing with," Boyer said about representing local clients in civil lawsuits. "Getting it resolved in their favor is something that is always satisfying."

Clients typically hire Noonan Lance when something has gone wrong.

"If they are doing things right, then they are avoiding litigation," Boyer said.

But sometimes things happen that are out of the client's control, he said.

Noonan Lance enjoys a close working relationship with its clients, in some cases for decades. In addition to a strong referral engine, clients repeatedly hire the Noonan Lance team when push comes to shove over a business dispute.

"We have a lot of great businesses here that are either old-school or cutting-edge



businesses," Boyer said. "Representing local clients keeps you connected in the community. You root for the local businesses, and

you hope that you are their first choice when they need help."
